The 2018 Philippine Standard Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (PSCCS) is the first edition of the country's classification of crimes.

WHAT IS PSCCS?



Hierarchical classification where criminal offenses are allocated into categories that have a certain degree of similarity.

Classification of criminal offenses which is based on internationally agreed concepts, definitions and principles in order to enhance the consistency and international comparability of crime statistics, and improve analytic capabilities at both the national and international levels.

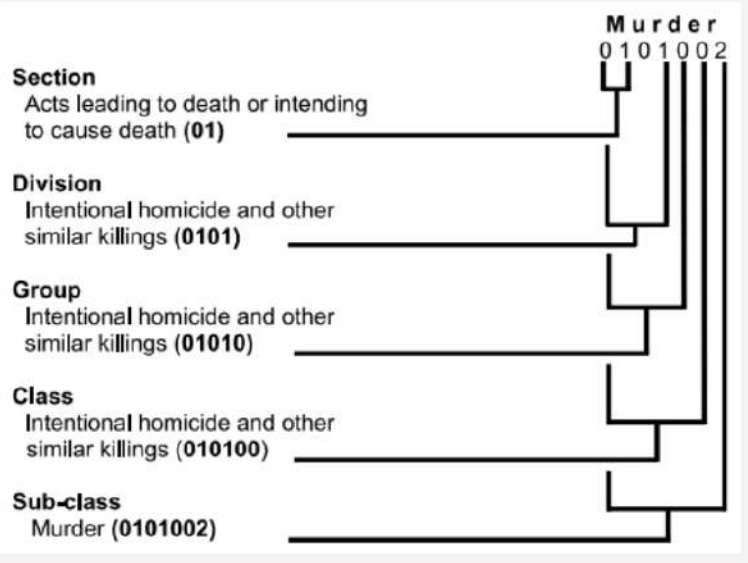
Patterned after the International Classification of Crime for Statistical Purposes (ICCS, Ver. 1) developed by the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC), and endorsed by the United Nations Statistical Commission (UNSC) as the standard international classification for crime statistics in 2015.

CATEGORIES OF CRIME / SECTIONS

- Act leading to death or intending to cause death
- Acts causing harm or intending to cause harm to the person
- Injurious acts of a sexual nature
- Acts against property involving violence or threat against person
- Acts against property only
- Acts involving controlled drugs or other psychoactive substance
- Acts involving fraud, deception or corruption
- Acts against public order, authority and provision of the state
- Acts against public safety and state security
- Acts against the natural environment
- Other criminal acts not elsewhere classified

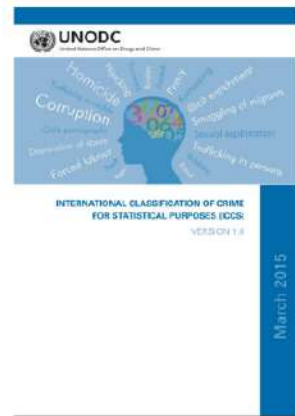
