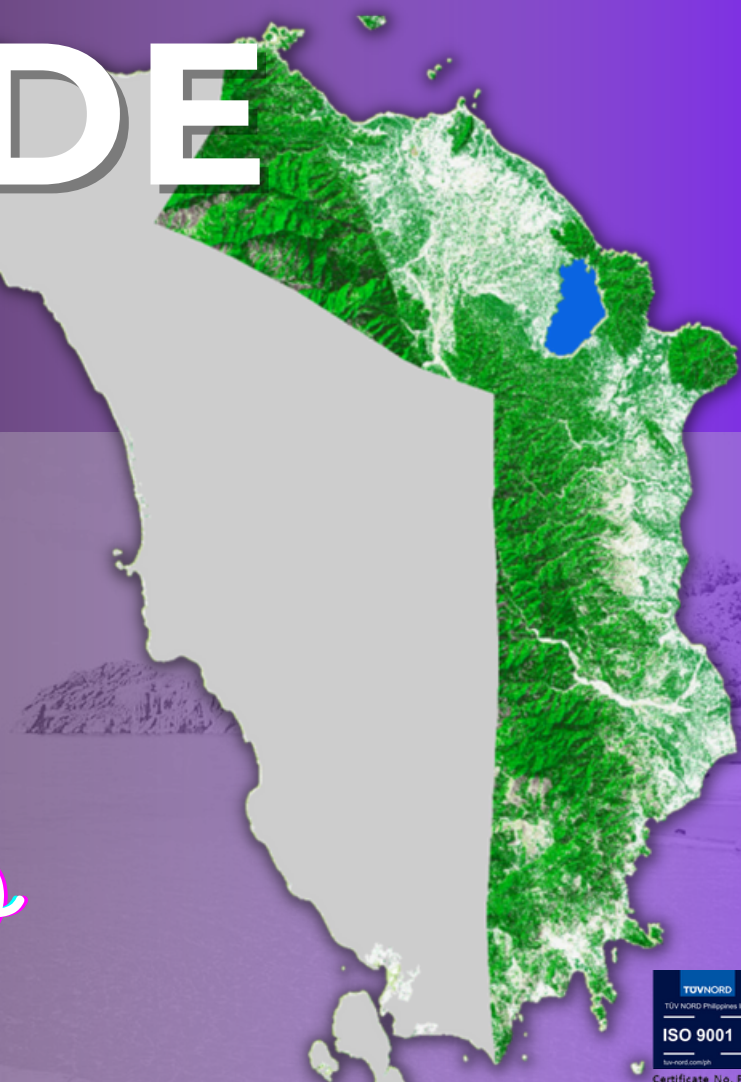


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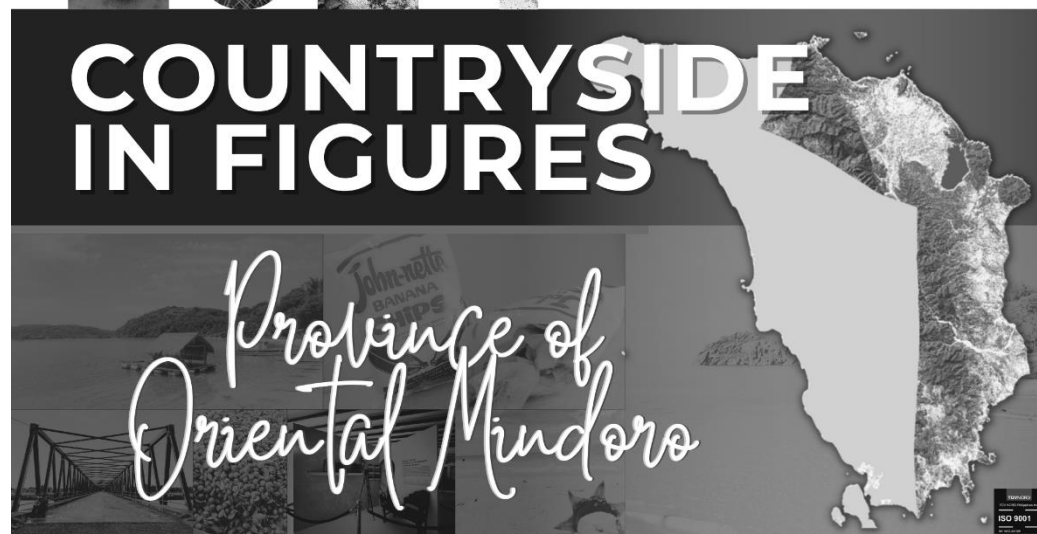

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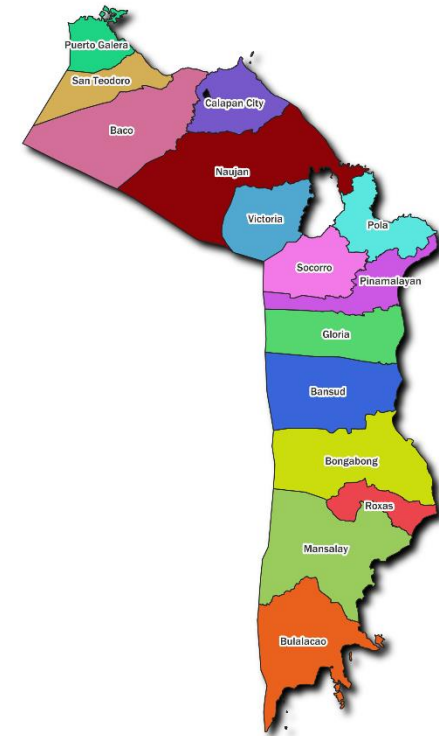
OVERVIEW OF THE PROVINCE

In the early years of Spanish rule, Mindoro was administered as part of the province of Bombon, the former name of Batangas. By the beginning of the seventeenth century, Mindoro was separated from Bombon. However, Mindoro was officially partitioned into provinces on June 13, 1950. Likewise, the province was named “Mina de Oro” by the Spaniards, for they believed it had large deposits of gold.

Oriental Mindoro occupies the eastern section of Mindoro Island and covers a total land area of 4,364.72 square kilometers. It comprises one (1) city, fourteen (14) municipalities, and four hundred twenty-six (426) barangays. Calapan City, the capital of the province, is 45 kilometers south of Batangas and 130 kilometers from Manila.

Numerous rivers and streams traverse the province. It has several inland bodies of water which include the most well-known Naujan Lake Natural Park. The lake is the habitat of the famous DABALISTIHIT (Dalag, Bangus, Banglis, Tilapia, and Hito). The province’s rich and arable land is suitable for agriculture. It produces large quantities of rice, corn, coconut, vegetables and fruits like calamansi, banana, rambutan, marang or uloy, lanzones and durian.

The province is known for three things that cannot be found anywhere else in the world: the indigenous Mangyans, the majestic Mt. Halcon and the Tamaraw (*Bubalus mindorensis*). It is also known for its tourist attractions like the white sand beaches of Puerto Galera.

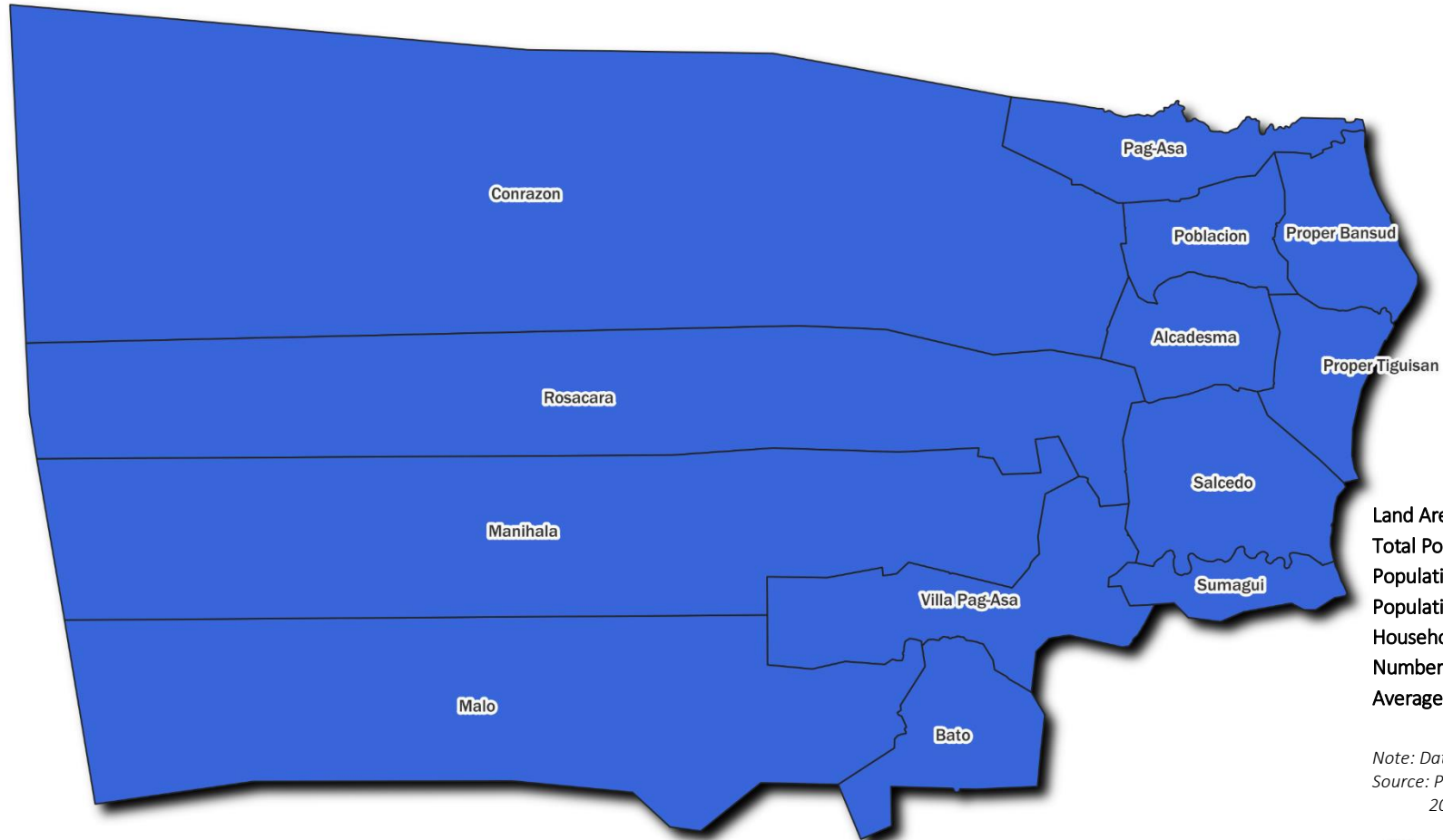

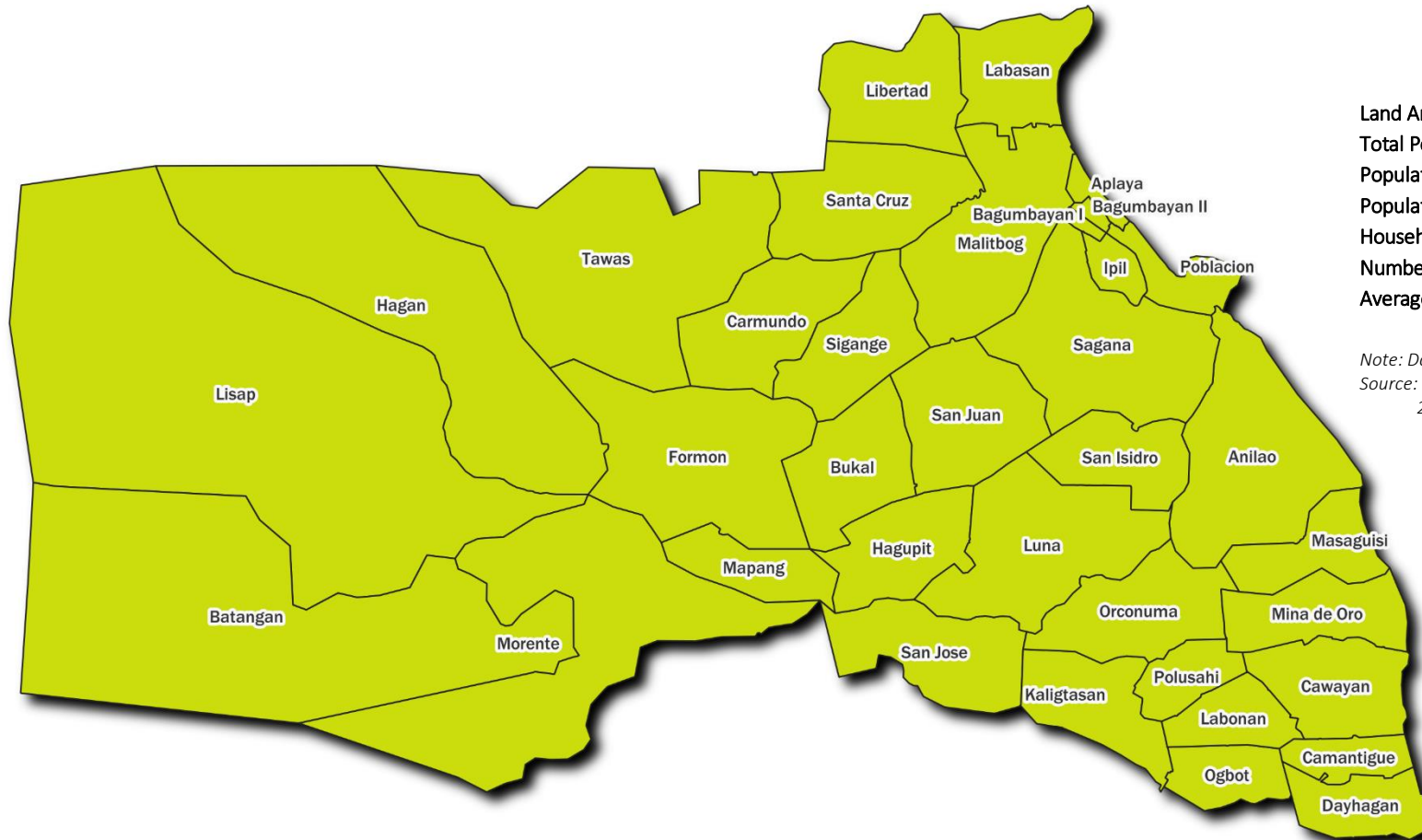

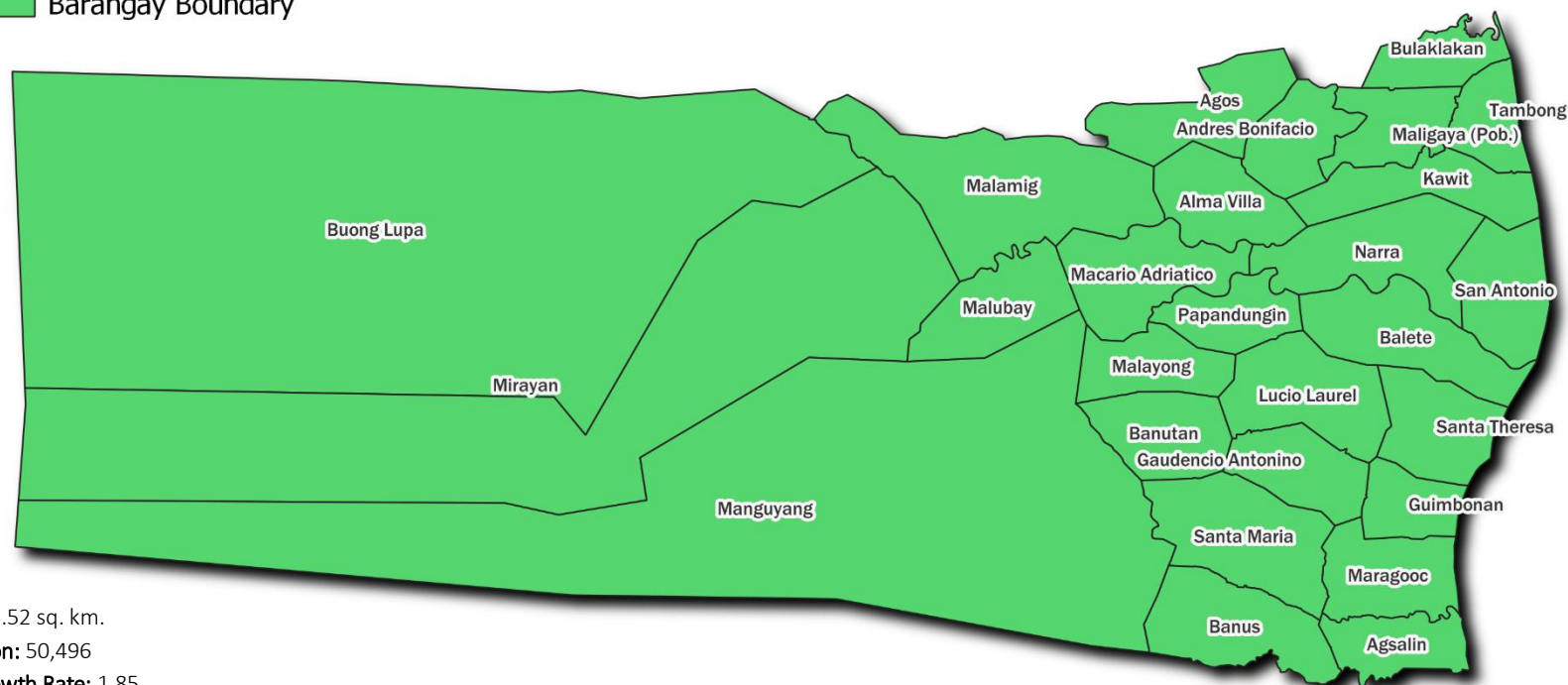

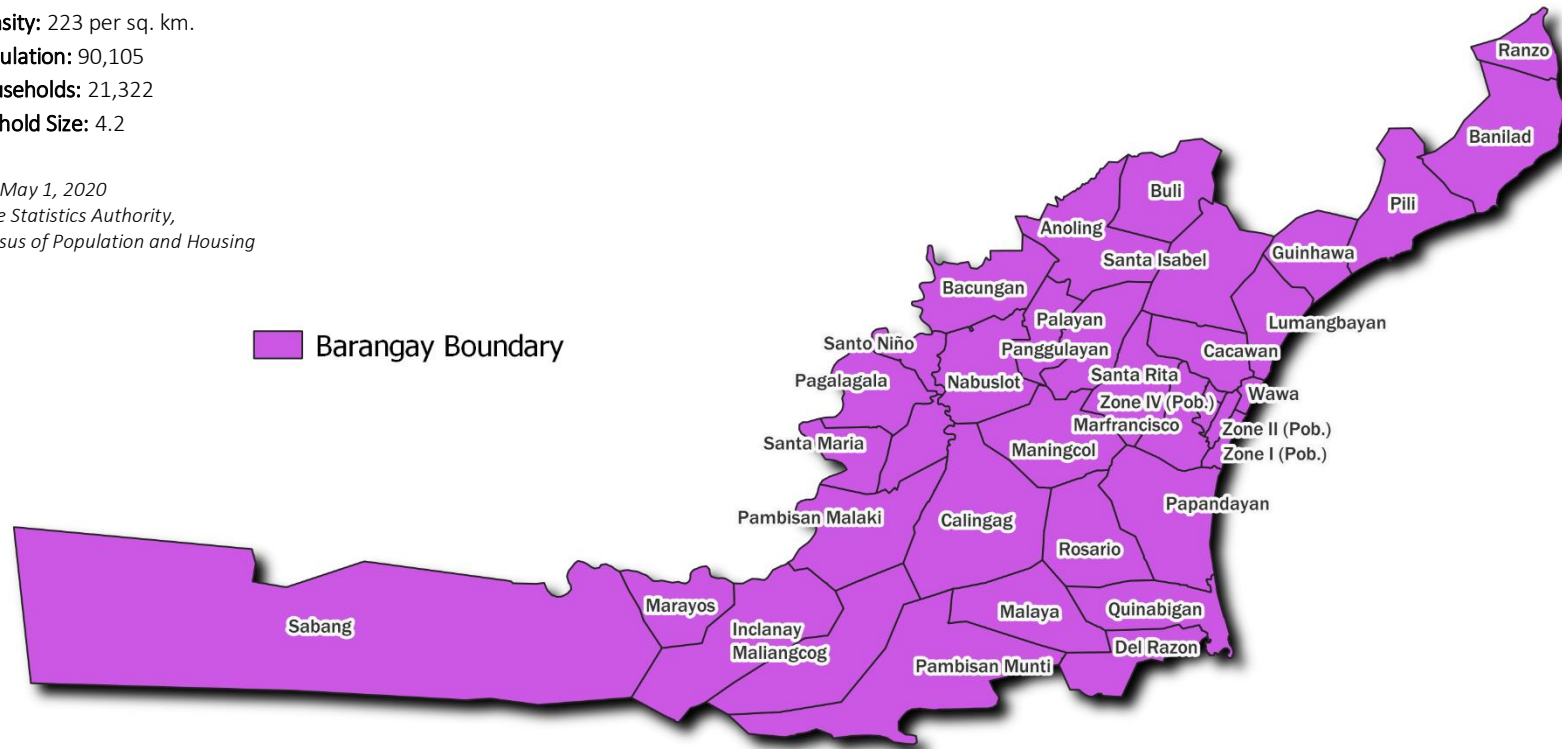

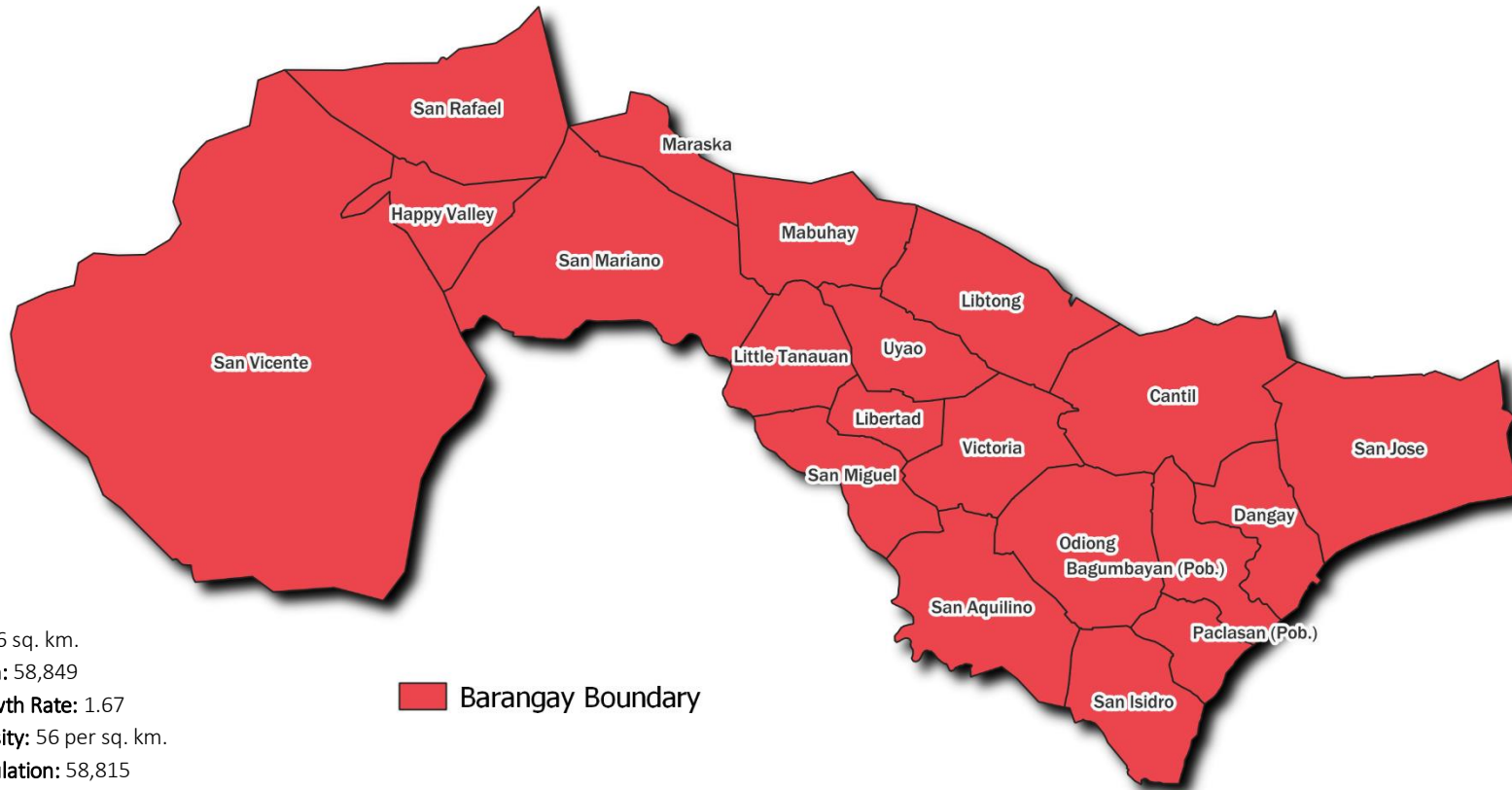

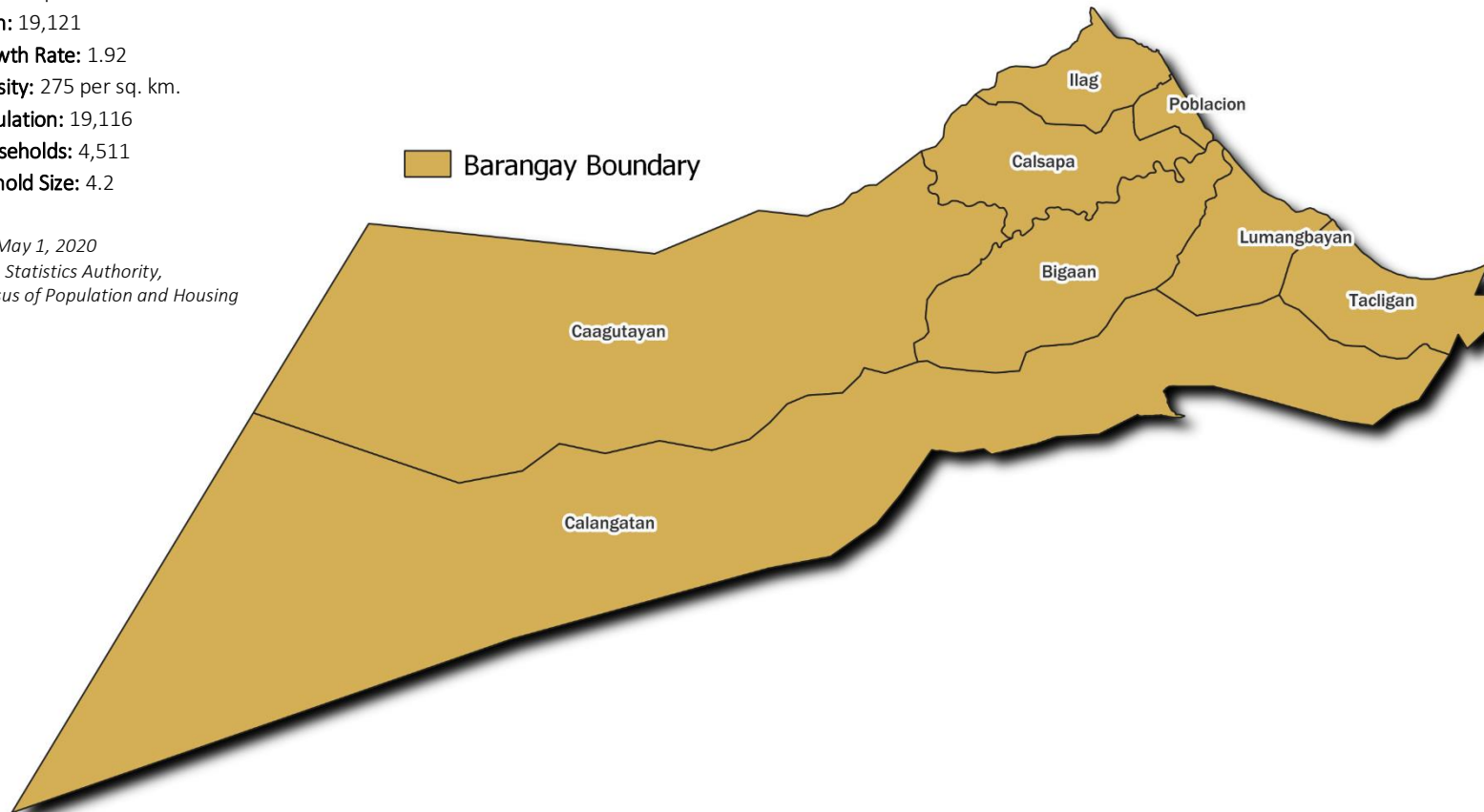

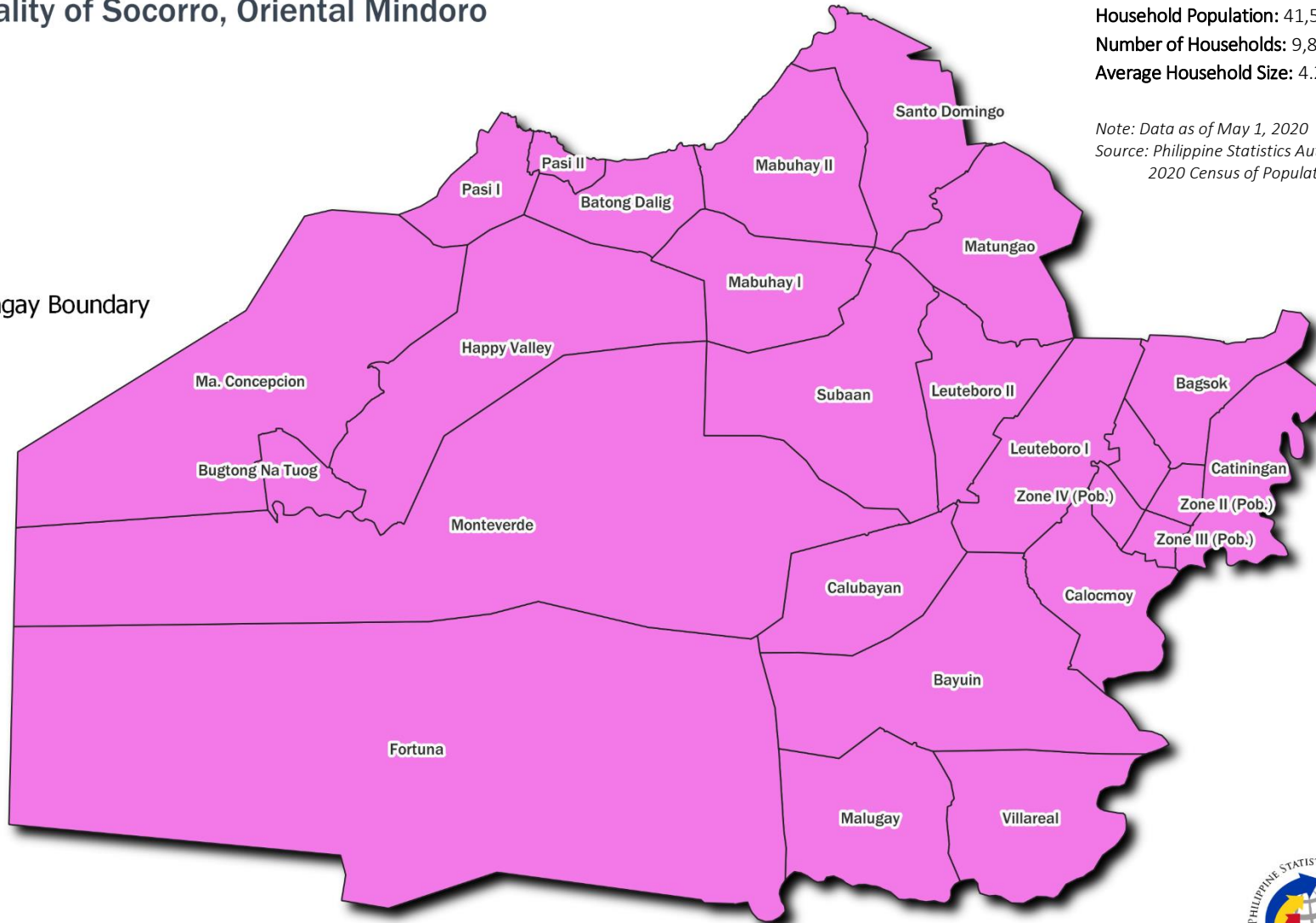

CHAPTER 1

GENERAL INFORMATION

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CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

- In 2022, the province had an average rainfall of 211.2 mm. Meanwhile, the average maximum and minimum temperatures, in degree Celsius, were recorded at 31.1 and 23.9, respectively.
- The Province of Oriental Mindoro, with a total land area of 4,238 sq. km., is composed of 1 city, 14 municipalities, and 426 barangays. Naujan is the biggest municipality with a land area of 503.1 sq. km., followed by the Municipality of Bongabong with a land area of 498.2 sq. km.
- The total population of the Province of Oriental Mindoro was 908,339 based on the results of the 2020 Census of Population and Housing (CPH). This was higher by 64,280 or 7.6 percent compared with the total population of 844,059 in 2015.
- The province registered an annual population growth rate (APGR) of 1.56 percent from 2015 to 2020 and 1.46 percent from 2010 to 2020.
- Of the 716,018 household population 10 years old and over, there were 279,625 or 39.1 percent that were single or never-married based on the result of the 2020 Census of Population and Housing. Moreover, more males (153,145) were single than females (126,480).
- By July 2025, the total population of the Province of Oriental Mindoro is projected to reach 946,174. Among these, males will register 50.8 percent share while females will account for a 49.2 percent share.
- The number of registered voters in the Province of Oriental Mindoro reached 564,128 in 2022.
- During the 2022 national and local elections, the province had 939 clustered precincts and registered an 82.3 percent voter's turnout. Among the city/municipalities, Mansalay recorded the highest voter's turnout of 85.5 percent.

CHAPTER 2

ECONOMIC ACTIVITIES

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CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

- A decreasing trend for palay and an increasing trend for corn were recorded in terms of the total volume of production and area harvested. The volume of production and the area harvested for palay registered a decline of 3.4 percent and 0.3 percent, respectively. While the volume of production and the area harvested for corn increased by 2.3 percent and 2.0 percent, respectively.
- The province's fruit crop production in 2023 estimated at 76,860 metric tons is 2.2 percent higher than the reported production in 2022. All the subsectors (major, priority, and minor fruits) recorded an upward trend of production at 1.3 percent, 97.7 percent, and 23.6 percent, respectively.
- From 2021 to 2023, cassava for food was predominantly produced among all vegetables in the province. Meanwhile, mature coconut with husk was predominantly produced among all non-food and industrial crops.
- In the 2023 inventory of livestock, swine/hog, goat, and carabao posted a substantial increase of 25.5, 38.5, and 44.6 percent respectively. Moreover, cattle also recorded a 13.1 percent increase in inventory. In terms of poultry in 2023, ducks and chicken registered a considerable increase of 9.5 and 8.5 percent, respectively.
- The total fish production of Oriental Mindoro recorded a substantial increase by 38.8 percent in 2023 from a decline of 33.3 percent in 2022. The huge increment was consequential to the increase in production of all fishery subsector of the province.
- The number of Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) owners and employment in the province increased in 2021. Of the 5,532 SMEs owner, 55.8 percent were females while 44.2 percent were males. In addition, 57.7 percent of the employed in SMEs were males.
- The economy of the province of Oriental Mindoro recorded an 8.2 percent growth in 2022 from 6.6 percent growth in 2021. This represents an increase in the value of the Gross Provincial Domestic Product or GDP from 101.1 billion pesos in 2021 to 109.4 billion pesos in 2022. Of the 8.2 percent growth in 2022, Services contributed 5.1 percentage points, Industry had 3.0 percentage points contribution, and Agriculture, forestry and fishing contributed 0.1 percentage point.

CHAPTER 3 SOCIAL SERVICES

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CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

- Of the 12,664 live births in 2022, males accounted for 51.2 percent while females comprised 48.8 percent.
- The province of Oriental Mindoro was able to record 4,289 marriages in 2022 with a 43.4 percent increase compared to 2021 with 2,990 marriages. Registered marriages increased in 13 municipalities of the province wherein the municipality of Bulalacao recorded the highest increment from 115 in 2021 to 590 marriages in 2022.
- In 2021, Oriental Mindoro recorded a total of 34 infant mortality cases from the 37 cases recorded in the previous year. Among the municipalities, Naujan recorded the highest infant mortality rate with 16 infant deaths for every 1,000 live births.
- In 2021, of the 70,912 weighed pre-schoolers, 5,187 children were underweight, 3,856 were overweight, 62,664 have normal weight, and 1,922 children were severely underweight. Males recorded higher number compared to females in terms of all nutritional status.
- Among the Technical-Vocational Education and Training (TVET) programs in the province, agriculture and fishery got the highest number of enrollment and graduates in 2021 with 7,611 and 8,202, respectively. Meanwhile, only 39 enrolled in program related to heating, ventilation, air conditioning and refrigeration with 79 graduates in the same year.
- The Bureau of Fire Protection MIMAROPA issued 20,839 fire safety inspection certificates for the year 2023. The City of Calapan has the highest number of issued fire safety inspection certificates of 4,487 followed by the municipality of Pinamalayan with 2,926, then the municipality of Naujan with 2,711.
- In 2023, the crime incidence in the province declined by 103 or 7.7 percent compared with 1,332 crime incidences in the previous year. Of the 1,229 total cases in 2023, 817 crimes were solved equivalent to a solution efficiency rate of 66.5 percent.

CHAPTER 4

INFRASTRUCTURE AND UTILITIES

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CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

- The province had an existing national road length of 329.81 kilometers in 2023. In terms of surface type, 61.6 percent of the roads were concrete while 38.4 percent were asphalt.
- As of 2023, Oriental Mindoro had 93 existing national bridges with a total length of 3,487 lineal meters. All of these bridges are classified as permanent bridges wherein 96.8 percent were concrete and the remaining 3.2 percent were steel.
- In 2023, of the three classifications (private, government, and for hire), 89.3 percent or 80,051 were classified under private motor vehicles. On the other hand, in terms of motor vehicles registered by type, 64,958 were motorcycles/tricycles, followed by utility vehicles with 12,810, and cars were 5,492.
- The number of issued permits/licenses in 2023 was recorded at 57,166. The issued licenses increased by 14,876 from 42,290 in 2022. Meanwhile, more males (44,960) were issued licenses than females (12,206).
- The province of Oriental Mindoro had 108 existing cell site towers in 2020. Of which, 51 were globe telecom, 44 were smart networks, and 13 were sun cellular.
- A total of 1,601 licensed radio stations were recorded in the province in 2020. Almost 54.9 percent of licensed radio stations were government-owned while 45.1 percent were privately owned radio stations.

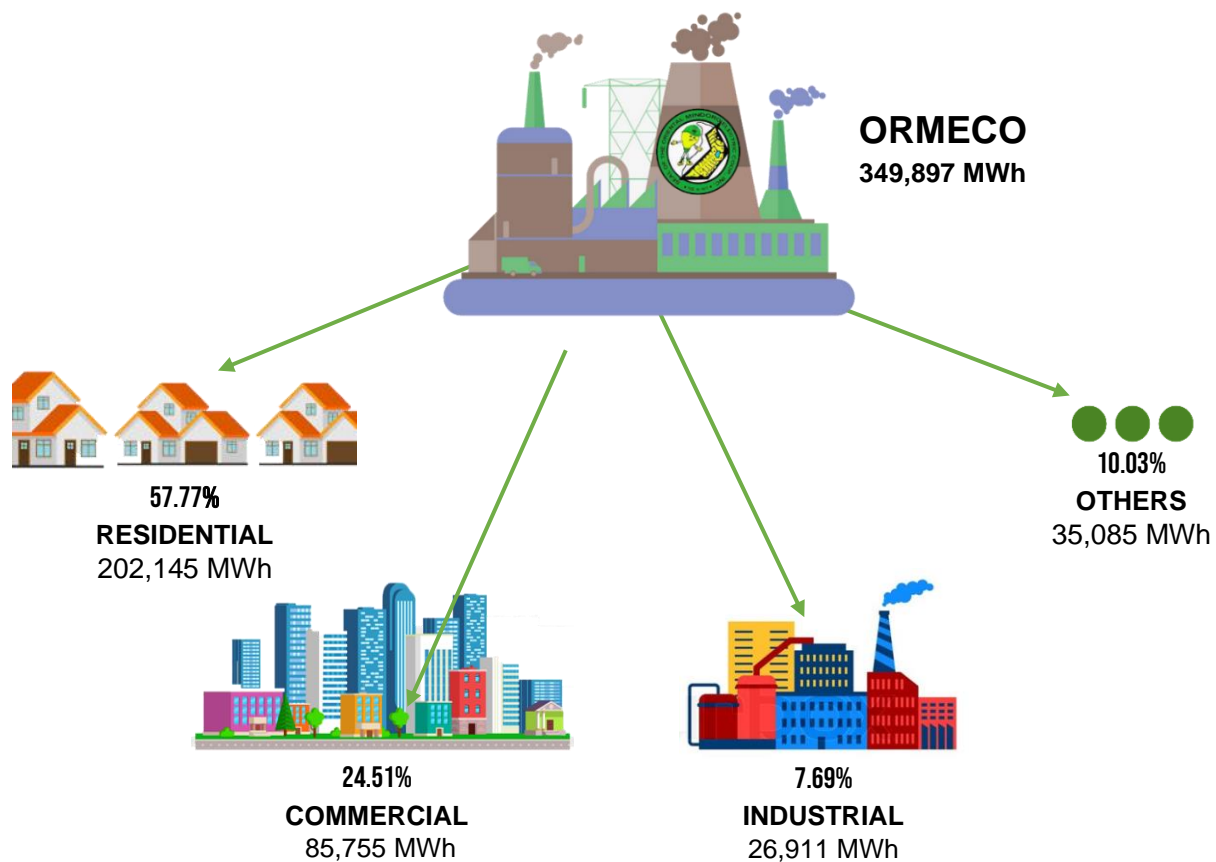

CHAPTER 5

FINANCIAL PROFILE

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CHAPTER HIGHLIGHTS

- The province of Oriental Mindoro was classified as first class with an average income of PhP 2.23 billion in 2020 to 2023. City of Calapan, classified as 3rd class municipality, recorded the highest average income of PhP 1.13 billion among the 15 city/municipalities. It was followed by the municipality of Naujan with an average income of PhP 421.57 million.
- The province of Oriental Mindoro has a PhP 2.15 billion beginning balance in the statement of income in 2023. Of the 15 city/municipalities, LGU Bongabong had the highest beginning balance of PhP 448.19 million, followed by LGU Naujan with PhP 382.22 million, and LGU Pinamalayan with PhP 239.21 million. Meanwhile, no data was provided for the beginning balance in the Statement of Income of the City of Calapan.
- In 2023, the province of Oriental Mindoro recorded a total of PhP 2.31 billion tax revenue. Internal revenue allotment, real property taxes, and local taxes recorded at PhP 2.19 billion, PhP 100.29 million, and PhP 17.69 million, respectively. Among the city/municipalities, City of Calapan recorded the highest tax revenue of PhP 1.10 billion, followed by LGU Naujan with PhP 428.87 million, and LGU Bongabong with PhP 351.06 million.
- On the other hand, the total non-tax revenue of the province was recorded at PhP 27.49 million. Of which, PhP 2.94 million were operating and miscellaneous revenues, PhP 10,000.00 were grants, PhP 1.17 million were interfund transfer, and PhP 30.10 million were interest income.
- The expenditure of the province was recorded at PhP 1.55 billion in 2023. Of these total expenditure, 42.9 percent came from general public services, the 39.8 percent was expenditures from social services, while 16.2 percent was economic services expenditure. Among the city/municipalities, City of Calapan had the highest expenditure of PhP 1.01 billion. It was followed by LGU Naujan with PhP 382.93 million and LGU Pinamalayan with PhP 294.51 million expenditure.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

Agricultural Production - the growing of field crops, fruits, nuts, seeds, tree nurseries (except those of forest trees), bulb vegetables and flowers, both in the open and under glass; and the production of coffee, tea, cocoa, rubber; and the production of livestock and livestock products, honey, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, silkworm, cocoons, etc. Forestry and fishery activities carried out as an ancillary activity on an agricultural holding is also considered as agricultural production. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Aquaculture – sector of fisheries that includes the rearing or raising under controlled conditions of aquatic products such as fish, oysters, mussels, sea weeds and other aquatic resources in sea, lakes and rivers. Examples are fishponds, fish pens and fish cages. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Area Harvested – refers to land used for agricultural operation reported as many times as it was planted and harvested to the same crop or different crops during the reference period. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Barangay – the smallest political unit into which cities and municipalities in the Philippines are divided. It is the basic unit of the Philippine political system. It consists of less than 1,000 inhabitants residing within the territorial limit of a city or municipality and administered by a set of elective officials, headed by a barangay chairman (punong barangay).

Birth – the act or process of delivering a child. It may either be a live birth or a stillbirth. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Birth, Live – refers to the complete expulsion or extraction of a product of conception from its mother, irrespective of the duration of pregnancy, which after such separation, breathes or shows any other evidence of life, such as beating of the heart, pulsation of the umbilical cord, or definite movement of voluntary muscles, whether or not the umbilical cord has been cut off or the placenta is still attached; each product of such births is considered alive. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Bridge – a structure across a waterway or other opening servicing as a pathway and/or roadway with a minimum clear span of six (6) meters. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Capital Revenue – resources realized from the sale of fixed or capital assets, such as building, equipment, machine and intangibles. **(Department of Budget and Management)**

City – there are three classes of cities in the Philippines: the highly urbanized, the independent component cities which are independent of the province, and the component cities which are part of the provinces where they are located and subject to their administrative supervision.

Cohort Survival Rate⁴ – the percentage of enrollees at the beginning grade or year in a given school year who reached the final grade or year of the elementary or secondary level.

Completion Rate⁴ – the percentage of first year entrants in a cycle of education surviving to the end of the cycle. **(Department of Education)**

Construction – this group includes construction, alteration, repair and demolition of building, highways, streets and culverts; construction of such projects as sewers and water, gas and electricity mains; railways, roadbeds, railroads, piers, tunnels, elevated highways, bridges, viaducts; dams, drainage projects, sanitation projects, aqueducts, irrigation and flood control projects; hydroelectric plants, water power projects; pipelines; marine construction such as dredging, underwater rock removal; pile driving, land reclamation; construction of harbors and waterways; water wells; airports and parking areas; athletic fields, golf courses, swimming pools, and tennis courts; communication systems such as telephone and telegraph lines; and other construction whether undertaken by private bodies or government authorities. Special trade contractors in the field of construction such as carpenters, plumbers, plasterers and electricians are also included in this group. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Crime – Is an act in violation of penal law. For statistical purposes, only crimes reported to authorities are covered. **(Philippine National Police)**

Crime Incidence – the number of crimes reported as to index or non-index crimes within a given period. **(Philippine National Police)**

Crime Rate – number of crimes committed per 100,000 population. **(Philippine National Police)**

Crop Production – the growing of staple food crops, fruits, nut and other food crops and commercial crops. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Crops, Major – the 21 crops, which collectively account for more than 95 percent of the total crop production. These include palay, corn, coconut, sugarcane, banana, pineapple, coffee, mango, tobacco, abaca, peanut, mongo, cassava, sweet potato, tomato, garlic, onion, cabbage, eggplant, calamansi, and rubber. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Crops, Minor – all the remaining crops other than the major crops. This group accounts for about 40 percent of the total crop production. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Crops, Priority – the identified national banner crops and various regional priority crops of the Key Commercial Crops Development Program (KCCDP), High Value Crops Development Program (HVDCP) and now the Key Commodity Road Maps of the Department of Agriculture, which are being developed because of their industrial and commercial potentials. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Consumer Price Index (CPI)⁹ – Indicator of the change in the average prices of a fixed basket of goods and services commonly purchased by households relative to a base year.

Day Care Service – an arrangement whereby substitute mothering is provided to disadvantaged pre-school children as well as street children during part of the day when the mother cannot attend to their children.

Death – refers to the permanent disappearance of all signs of life of a living person at any time. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Distribution of Electricity – refers to the conveyance or delivery of electricity by a distribution utility to end-users.

Drop-out Rate or School Leaver Rate⁴ – the proportion of pupils/students who leave school during the year as well as those who complete the grade/year level but fail to enroll to the next grade/year level the following school year to the total number of pupils/students enrolled during the previous school year. **(Department of Education)**

Electric Cooperative – refers to a cooperative or corporation authorized to provide electric service pursuant to Presidential Decree No. 269⁵, as amended, or Republic Act No. 6938⁶.

Elementary Education – the first stage of free and compulsory, formal education primarily concerned with providing basic education and usually corresponding to six and seven grades. Elementary education can likewise be attained through alternative learning system. **(Department of Education)**

Enrolment⁴ – the total number of pupils/students who register/enlist in a school year.

Family – is a group of persons usually living together and composed of the head and other persons related to the head by blood, marriage and adoption. A single person living alone is considered a separate family. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Family Expenditures – refers to the expenses or disbursements made by the family purely for personal consumption during the reference period. They exclude all expenses in relation to farm or business operations, investment ventures, purchase of real property and other disbursements which do not involve personal consumption. Gifts, support, assistance or relief in goods and services received by the family from friends, relatives, etc. and consumed during the reference period are included in the family expenditures. Value consumed from net share of crops, fruits and vegetables produced or livestock raised by other households, family sustenance and entrepreneurial activities are also considered as family expenditures. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Family Income – includes primary income and receipts from other sources received by all family members during the calendar year as participants in any economic activity or as recipients of transfers, pensions, grants, etc. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

- Primary income includes:
 1. Salaries and wages from employment,
 2. Commissions, tips, bonuses, family and clothing allowance, transportation and representation allowance and honoraria, and
 3. Other forms of compensation and net receipts derived from the operation of family-operated enterprises/activities and the practice of profession or trade.
- Income from other sources include:
 1. Imputed rental values of owner-occupied dwelling units,
 2. Interests,
 3. Rentals including land owner's share of agricultural products,
 4. Pensions,
 5. Support and value of food and non-food items received as gifts by the family (as well as the imputed value of services rendered free of charge to the family), and
 6. Receipts from family sustenance activities, which are not considered as family operated enterprise.

Fishing, Commercial – sector of fisheries that includes the catching of fish in marine waters with the use of fishing boat of more than three (3) gross tons. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Fishing, Municipal – sector of fisheries that includes the catching of fish in marine and inland waters with the use of fishing boat of three (3) gross tons or less, or using gear not requiring the use of boats. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Food Threshold (FT)¹⁰ – the minimum income/expenditure required for a family/individual to meet the basic food needs, which satisfies the nutritional requirements for economically necessary and socially desirable physical activities.

Graduation Rate⁴ – the proportion of pupils/students who finished Grade VI/Fourth Year in the present year to the number of pupils/students who enrolled in Grade VI/Fourth Year in the present year. **(Department of Education)**

Grants – all non-repayable transfers received from other levels of government or from private individuals, or institutions including reparations and gifts given for particular projects or programs, or for general budget support. **(Department of Budget and Management)**

General Public Services – these covers expenditures for services which are indispensable to the existence of an organized state and cannot be allocated to specific sectors or subsectors. This includes executive and legislative services; overall financial and fiscal services; civil services; planning; conduct of foreign affairs; general research, public order and safety and centralized services.

Generation of Electricity – refers to the production of electricity by a generation or co-generation facility.

Household¹ – a social unit consisting of a person living alone or a group of persons who sleep in the same housing unit and have a common arrangement in the preparation and consumption of food.

Household Population – the aggregate of private household population. Compared to total population, this excludes population enumerated in institutional households such as national/provincial/municipal/city jails/detention centers, military camps, tuberculosis pavilions, mental hospitals, leprosaria/leper colonies or drug rehabilitation centers. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Index Crimes – refer to those violations of the penal code considered to have socio-economic significance and occur with sufficient regularity to be meaningful. These include crimes versus person (murder, homicide, physical injury and rape), and crimes versus property (robbery and theft).

Infant Mortality Rate (IMR)¹⁵ – the probability of dying between birth and age one, expressed as the number of infant deaths or deaths occurring before reaching 12 months of life in a given period per 1,000 live births.

Inflation Rate - the annual rate of change or the year-on-year change in the Consumer Price Index.

License – an authority issued by the Land Transportation Office (LTO) to a person who is qualified to operate a vehicle. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Livestock – domesticated animals with four legs and with hoofs. The different livestock are carabaos, cattles, goats, horses, rabbits, etc. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Marital Status⁹ – status of an individual in relation to marriage, classified as follows:

- *Single* – refers to a person who has never been married;
- *Married* – refers to a couple living together as husband and wife, legally or consensually;
- *Divorced* – refers to a person whose bond of matrimony has been dissolved legally and who therefore can remarry;
- *Separated* – refers to a person separated legally or not from his/her spouse because of marital discord or misunderstanding; and
- *Widowed* – refers to a person whose bond of matrimony has been dissolved by death of his/her spouse.

Maternal Mortality Rate (MMR)¹⁵ – the ratio between the number of women who died (for reasons of pregnancy, childbirth and puerperium) to the number of reported livebirths in a given year, expressed as the number of maternal deaths per 100,000 live births

Mortality – the intensity of death in a population. It is sometimes used to mean the frequency of deaths in a population. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Mortality, Maternal – refers to deaths of mothers owing to deliveries and complications arising from pregnancy, childbirth and puerperium. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Mortality Rate – generally expresses the chance that death will occur during a particular period to a person in particular population group alive at the beginning of the period. As such, those rates are true probabilities and describe precisely the risk of dying for any actual cohort. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Mortality Rate, Child¹⁵ – the number of deaths among children aged 1-4 years old per 1,000 children in the same age group. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Motor Vehicles, For Hire – motor vehicles registered and authorized to be operated as public utility by virtue of certificate of public convenience or provisional authority issued by the Land Transportation Franchising and Regulatory Board (LTFRB). **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Motor Vehicles, Government – motor vehicles owned by the Government of the Philippines or any of its political subdivisions. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Motor Vehicles, Private – motor vehicles registered not to be used for hire under any circumstances. Private motor vehicles are subclassified into the same denominations as that of For-Hire Motor Vehicles except for taxicabs. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Municipality – is a political corporate body which is endowed with the facilities of a municipal corporation, exercised by and through the municipal government in conformity with law. It is a subsidiary of the province which consists of a number of barangays within its territorial boundaries, one of which is the seat of government found at the town proper (poblacion).

National Electrification Administration (NEA)⁵ - Refers to the government agency created under Presidential Decree No. 269, to act as a catalyst for the development of electric distribution utilities (EDUs) by providing world-class financial intermediation institutional and technical services.

Non-Index Crimes - refer to all other crimes not classified as index crimes. These are mostly composed of victimless offenses (e.g., crimes against national security, crimes against the fundamental laws of the state, crimes against public order, crimes against public morals, and violations of special laws).

Non-Tax Revenue – revenue collected from sources other than compulsory tax levies. Includes those collected in exchange for direct services rendered by government agencies to the public, or those arising from the government's regulatory and investment activities. **(Department of Budget and Management)**

Participation Rate⁴ – the ratio of the enrolment for the age group corresponding to the official school age in the elementary/secondary level to the population of the same age group in a given year. Also known as Net Enrolment Ratio (NER).

Performance Indicators – refer to several key indicators that can be computed and utilized for evaluating the educational system's performance at various levels, using the data available in the education statistics data bank. These indicators constitute an important component of a management information system. **(Department of Education)**

Poultry – are classified as chickens whether native or hybrid, ducks, quails, geese, etc. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Poverty Incidence (PI)¹⁰ - the proportion of families/individuals with per capita income/ expenditure less than the per capita poverty threshold to the total number of families/individuals.

Poverty Threshold (PT)¹⁰ – the minimum income/expenditure required for a family/ individual to meet the basic food and non-food requirements.

Basic food requirements are currently based on 100% adequacy for the Recommended Energy and Nutrient Intake (RENI) for protein and energy equivalent to an average of 2000 kilocalories per capita per day, and 80% adequacy for other nutrients. On the other hand, basic non-food requirements, indirectly estimated by obtaining the ratio of food to total basic expenditures from a reference group of families, cover expenditure on:

1. clothing and footwear,
2. housing,
3. fuel, light, water,
4. maintenance and minor repairs,
5. rental of occupied dwelling units,
6. medical care,
7. education,
8. transportation and communication,
9. non-durable furnishings,
10. household operations, and
11. personal care and effects.

Pre-School – a school that admits students who are not old enough to enter the first level of education. These pupils are usually from 4 to 5 years of age. **(Department of Education)**

Population⁹ – total number of individuals in a territory at a specified time. It covers both nationals and aliens, native and foreign-born persons, internees, refugees and any other group physically present within the borders of a country at a specified time. In assembling national demographic statistics for publication, the basic aim has been to obtain data for the physically present (or “de facto”) population rather than for the legally established resident (or “de jure”) inhabitants.

Population Growth Rate⁹ – indicates how fast a population increases or decreases as a result of the interplay of births, deaths, and migration during a given period of time. Where the population is closed, meaning no migration, the population growth rate is the same as the rate of natural increase, i.e., the difference between the number of births and the number of deaths during a specified period of time. The three methods for computing the rate of growth based on the assumption with respect to the change are: arithmetic change, geometric change and exponential change.

Population Projections⁹ - computation of future changes in population numbers, given certain assumptions about future trends in the rates of fertility, mortality and migration. Demographers often publish high, medium, and low projections of the same population based on different assumptions of how these rates will change in the future.

Province – the largest unit in the political structure of the Philippines. It consists, in varying numbers, of municipalities and, in some cases, of component cities. Its functions and duties in relation to its component cities and municipalities are generally coordinative and supervisory.

Private Institutions/Schools – educational institutions maintained and administered by private individuals or groups. **(Department of Education)**

Public Institutions/Schools – educational institutions established by law and administered by the government. **(Department of Education)**

Purchasing Power of the Peso⁹ – a measure of the real value of the peso in a given period relative to a chosen reference period. It is computed by getting the reciprocal of the CPI and multiplying the result by 100.

Radio Stations – one or more transmitters or receivers or a combination of transmitters and receivers including the accessory equipment, necessary at one location for carrying on a radio communication service. Each station shall be classified by the service in which it operates permanently or temporarily. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Repetition Rate – the proportion of pupils who enroll in the same grade/year more than once to the total number of pupils/students enrolled in that grade/year during the previous year. **(Department of Education)**

Retention Rate – the proportion of the enrolment in any school year that continues to be in school the following year. **(Department of Education)**

Revenue – a cash inflow which does not increase the liability of the government. **(Department of Budget and Management)**

School – institution recognized by the state which undertakes educational operations. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

School Year – the period of time, of approximately 32 to 40 weeks, when schools offer daily instruction broken by short intermission periods (e.g., Christmas and summer vacations and holidays). **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Secondary School – an educational institution offering secondary education usually consisting of a four-year general secondary curriculum. **(Department of Education)**

Secondary Education – the stage of formal education following the elementary level concerned primarily with continuing basic education and expanding it to include the learning of employable gainful skills, usually corresponding to four years of high school. **(Department of Education)**

Social Services - this covers expenditure for education, health, social security, labor and employment, housing and community development and other social activities.

Social Welfare Services – include care of the aged, care of the disabled and mentally defective, childcare, and other welfare services. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Source of Income, Main – refers to the source from which most of the income of the family is obtained. If the family has more than one source of income, the main source that would be considered is the source where the bulk of income is derived. Main sources of income could either be:

1. **Salaries and Wages** – includes all forms of compensation whether in cash or in kind received by family members who are regular or occasional/seasonal workers in agricultural and non-agricultural industries;
2. **Entrepreneurial Activity** – or a family-operated activity is any economic activity, business or enterprise whether in agricultural or in non-agricultural enterprises, engaged by any member of the family as an operator or as self-employed. Included as family-operated activities are those which are operated as single proprietorship or loose partnership (without formal organizations). Thus, partnerships, corporations, associations, etc. which are formally organized are excluded; or
3. **Other Sources** – refer to the sources of income other than work. Other sources of income include net share of crops, fruits and vegetables and livestock, poultry from other households; cash receipts, gifts and other forms of assistance from abroad; cash receipts, support, assistance and relief from domestic source; rental from non-agricultural lands,

buildings, spaces and other properties; interest from dividends and loans; pension and retirement, workmen's compensation and social security benefits; imputed rental value of owner-occupied dwelling units; net receipts from family sustenance activities; dividends from investment; goods and services received as gifts; and other sources of income not elsewhere classified. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Student – one who regularly attends an educational institution of secondary or higher level. **(National Economic and Development Authority)**

Subsistence Incidence (S)¹⁰ – the proportion of families/individuals with per capita income/ expenditure less than the per capita food threshold to the total number of families/ individuals.

Taxes on Income and Profit – taxes imposed on all taxable income earned or received by a taxpayer whether an individual, partnership, or corporation, during a particular period of time, usually lasting one year. **(Department of Budget and Management)**

Transition Rate – the percentage of pupils who graduate from one level of education and move on to the next higher level (from primary to intermediate; from intermediate to secondary). **(Department of Education)**

White Corn – corn grown and used mainly for human consumption and manufacture of corn by-products such as cornstarch, corn oil, syrup, dextrin, glucose, gluten, etc. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Yellow Corn – corn used generally as feed grains. It includes all types of corn other than white. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**

Yield – the average production per unit area. It is an indicator of productivity derived by dividing the total production by the area harvested. **(Philippine Statistics Authority)**
